
## Ulrich Museum purchases aerial photograph of Kansas town

It's not every day the Ulrich Museum of Art buys art to increase its collection of nearly 7,000 pieces.

"Purchasing a piece happens less often, but it is wise because it helps establish a relationship with an artist," said Patricia McDonnell, museum director. "It's also a really great way to honor them."

The museum recently bought "The Watering Hole," featured in "Terry Evans: Matfield Green Stories," on display through Nov. 27.

The photograph is one in a series showcasing the town of Matfield Green, which is northeast of Wichita in the Flint Hills.

"My task as an artist is to tell the stories of the prairie," Evans said in 2001. She received a bachelor of fine arts in painting from the University of Kansas in 1968 and began professional photography in the early '70s

Evans will speak at 6 p.m. Nov. 18 in the Ulrich Museum as part of the Kansas Artists Symposium: Oz Kansas Creative Culture at 150.

She will also speak Nov. 19 at the Wichita Art Museum, 1400 W. Museum Blvd.

A complementary exhibit featuring the abstract paintings of Anne Appleby will be displayed at the Ulrich on Sept. 10.

"Evans' art exhibit connects with nature. These are realistic photographs," McDonnell said. "The exhibit in September is also about nature because it shares the same philosophical core. They are expressed in very different ways, ways we think will complement each other."
